I have discussed with Mr Coles at No 10 how he envisages the Chequers discussions being handled. As a general point, he has stressed his concern that any decision-making at Chequers should be fed in as soon as possible afterwards into the Whitehall machinery in order that the conclusions do not get lost. He is therefore likely, after the meetings, to commission various papers (eg for OD) in the light of discussion at Chequers. As far as attendance, agenda and timing are concerned, I attach a list updating the enclosure to Mr Coles' <u>letter to Mr Fall of 22 July.</u> You will see that Lord Thomas of Swynnerton has been added to the list for the morning of 8 September, as well as Mr Heseltine; that Mr Stanley has been added for the morning of 9 September; and that Lord Cockfield will be present for the lunch and Middle East discussion on 9 September.

Mr Coles added the following glosses (which represent Mr Coles' recommendations to the Prime Minister; she may not necessarily stick to them):

8 September

East/West Relations discussion with Academics a.m.

The eight papers written by the academics come under four general headings, with two papers on each. Mr Coles envisages spending one hour each on these general headings, with the two relevant academics being given five minutes each at the beginning of the hour to summarise their views. After these summaries the floor would then be open to general discussion. He sees the purpose of this discussion as being to bring out the nature of the Soviet Union and the Soviet regime, as background to the 'official' session in the afternoon. But he has suggested that the Prime Minister should encourage the academics to say at every point what they think the British Government/the West should be doing. General discussion of this subject could continue at lunch (at which the academics will still be present).

General priorities and East/West relations p.m.

Mr Coles thought that this session would probably go on until 5.30 pm or 6 pm. He has suggested to the Prime Minister that the first 45 minutes or so might be devoted to looking at the paper on Britain's global interests and priorities in the light of the Secretary of State's covering minute.

Mr Coles did not think this could be a decisionmaking discussion but that a paper on the allocation
or resources for our overall effort overseas might
be commissioned to follow it up.
After this 45 minutes Mr Coles envisaged discussion
turning to our strategy on East/West relations (which
was the Prime Minister's main interest). He hoped
this would be a decision-making session. He was
suggesting to the Prime Minister that she should
first of all go through the summary of conclusions
in the FCO paper, discussing each in turn as
appropriate, and then move on to the action programme,
taking the various elements of this similarly.

9 September

a.m. Arms Control and Disarmament

Mr Coles was suggesting to the Prime Minister that she should concentrate discussion for the most part on the strategic agenda paper and the four main questions posed in it (which would also cover the issue raised by Mr Heseltine's paper of the possibility of a distinct voice for Britain). Discussion might also cover the state of play in the various disarmament fields, with a view in particular to considering whether new work/initiatives were needed.

Mr Coles envisaged the Friday buffet lunch as more or

less social.

Mr Coles thought it was inevitable that there would be some discussion of the present situation in Lebanon and the future of our MNF contingent. He therefore thought it best to begin with this in order to get it out of the way (I said that we hoped to have sent to No 10 by then some thoughts which might provide a focus for the discussion). He then envisaged covering four broad questions:

- (a) Arab/Israel, in particular how far we or the Ten should try to fill the gap in Western policy left by US elections.
- (b) Whether we should do more to help the Palestinian inhabitants of the West Bank and Gaza.
- (c) Whether we should pursue a more active policy in the Gulf, including on the Iran/Iraq war.

(d) Trade and financial issues, in particular whether our political stance was sufficiently attuned to our commercial interests.

Mr Coles envisaged this discussion finishing at 4.30 pm to 5 pm.
