FRANCIS PYM AND I WILL, I FEAR, NEED TO LEAVE VERSAILLES ON SUNDAY NIGHT, IMMEDIATELY AFTER YOUR GRAND DINNER. I HOPE YOU WILL UNDERSTAND WHY, IN MY SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES AT THIS TIME, I FEEL THAT I MUST RETURN TO LONDON THAT NIGHT, WITHOUT STAYING ON FOR THE OPERA AND THE FIREWORKS. I VERY MUCH REGRET

THIS: GEOFFREY HOWE AND ROBERT ARMSTRONG WILL BE THERE IN MY PLACE. DO PLEASE FORGIVE WE FOR DISTURBING YOUR ARRANGEMENTS. OUR DISCUSSIONS AT VERSAILLES WILL BE OF THE GREATEST IMPORTANCE AND I SHALL PLAY THE FULLEST POSSIBLE PART IN THEM. ENDS

DEPARTURE FROM VERSAILLES

Thank you for your letter of 2 June.

The Prime Minister agrees generally with its contents but would like a slightly revised message to be sent to President Mitterrand. I enclose the text. You will see that this incorporates the point which you suggested might be made orally.

The Prime Minister agrees that it would be very helpful if the Chancellor of the Exchequer and Sir Robert Armstrong would stay on after her departure and attend both the opera and the fireworks.

With regard to your fourth paragraph, as soon as you can confirm that the Prime Minister's message to President Mitterrand has been delivered, we shall take steps to make known informally to the British Press in advance that the Prime Minister intends to leave the Summit early.

I am sending copies of this letter and its enclosure to John Kerr (HM Treasury) and David Wright (Cabinet Office).

Francis Richards, Esq., Foreign and Commonwealth Office. I am greatly looking forward to meeting you again on Friday and to taking part in the excellent programme which has been arranged for the Versailles Summit.

I much regret, however, to have to tell you that Francis Pym and I will need to leave Versailles on Sunday night immediately after your Grand Dinner, so that I shall miss the Opera and the Fireworks. I am sure you will understand that it would not be appropriate for me to be seen publicly at such entertainment at a time when heavy fighting may be in progress in or around the Falklands. In addition, I have to be back in London on Sunday night to prepare for a meeting with my Ministers early on Monday morning.

Do please forgive me for disturbing your arrangements. Our discussions at Versailles will be of the greatest importance and I shall play the fullest possible part in them.

Departure from Versailles

We spoke, and you confirmed that the Prime Minister would stay for President Mitterrand's Grand Dinner on 6 June but would return to London that night, missing the Opera and Fireworks.

The view of the Embassy in Paris is that the risk that President Mitterrand will take the Prime Minister's early departure amiss would be greatly reduced if they are authorised to deliver a very short personal message from the Prime Minister to President Mitterrand, and I attach a draft. We agreed that the Embassy might also be given discretion, if they felt that it would be useful, to add that apart from the reasons mentioned in the message, an additional consideration in the Prime Minister's mind is the distress that might be caused in this country if she were to be seen publicly at entertainment such as the Opera or the Fireworks display at a time when heavy fighting may well be in progress in or around the Falklands.

The Embassy also advised that it would help them greatly in presenting the Prime Minister's decision if they were able to say that the Chancellor of the Exchequer and - given the very prominent place accorded to Special Representatives at the Versailles Summit - Sir Robert Armstrong would stay on after the Prime Minister's departure and attend both the Opera and the Fireworks. The Foreign Secretary very much hopes that this can be arranged. If you agreed, we would envisage the Ambassador taking action with the Elysee in the course of this afternoon.

The Embassy have also made the point that it would greatly reduce the risk of misunderstanding if the Prime Minister's intention to leave early were made known informally to the British press well in advance.

I am sending copies of this letter to John Kerr and to David Wright who I hope will also be able to confirm their



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agreement to what is proposed.

I hope you will forgive me; I very much look forward to the rest of the programme you have arranged for the Summit.
