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# PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTE 111 (produced 4th May 1982)

#### 1. Introduction

The Sunday Times on 2nd May 1982 included the results of an MORI survey on attitudes to the Falkland Islands dispute. The interviewing for the survey was conducted on 30th April 1982 and in addition to questions on attitudes to the Falkland Islands dispute, the survey included a standard voting intention question. the MORI survey found 43% claiming they would vote Conservative, 30% Labour and 25% for the Liberals or Social Democrats. The results of this latest MORI study compares with the results of the previous MORI study conducted 25/26 April 1982 which found 40% claiming they would vote Conservative, 31% Labour, 27% for the Liberals or Social Democrats. The findings from these MORI polls compare with the results from our latest 'tracking' study conducted from 21st to 26th April which found 311/2% claiming they will vote Conservative, 33% Labour and 35% for the Liberals and Social Democrats. The interviewing for the Gallup tracking study was completed largely before the interviewing for the earliest MORI sutdy and was spread over a period which saw rapid developments in the Falkland Islands dispute. It is difficult not to conclude that the period since early last week (week starting 25th April) has seen a major move of public opinion towards the Government. The table below summarises this movement.

It would appear that we have seen a very sharp further movement of support away from the SDP/Liberals to the Government. In a rapidly changing situation (all these surveys had been completed several days before the first bombing of the Port Stanley airfield) it is impossible to predict whether this improvement will be maintained even until the local government elections on May 6th.

Details of the trend in support as shown in our Gallup tracking studies in recent weeks are shown on the following page.

#### 2. Government Record

The results of the latest 'tracking' study completed well before the latest developments in the Falkland crisis found effectively no change in the popularity of the Government, with 34% approving of our record to date and 55% disapproving. Details are shown on the following page.

## 3. Popularity of Political Leaders

Mrs Thatcher's popularity remained almost unchanged in our latest study. Mr Foot's popularity dropped slightly after the dramatic improvement in the previous study (13/19 April). Mr Steel's popularity improved slightly - back to a level last reached in late 1981. Details are shown below:-

#### 4. Published Polls

## (a) MORI (Sunday Times 2nd May 1982)

The interviewing for the MORI poll published in the Sunday Times on 2nd May was conducted on 30th April. The voting intention part of this survey is considered in the introduction to this note. The survey was mainly concerned with attitudes to the Falkland Islands dispute. The survey found six out of ten electors would not be prepared to lose one serviceman's life to regain the Falklands. MORI asked 'Which should determine the British Government's long-term policy on the Falkland Islands - the wishes of the Falkland Islanders alone or the interests of Britain as a whole, taking the Falkland Islanders' views into account?' Only 24% selected the Falkland Islanders' wishes, 72% selected the interests of Britain as a whole.

MORI found seven out of ten electors claiming to be satisfied with the Government's handling of the situation. 62% thought that the Government's readiness to use force had been 'about right'. Only 18% thought the Government was too willing to use military force and 16% thought that the Government had not been willing enough to use military force.

## (b) NOP (Standard 4th May 1982)

The Standard on 4th May included the results of an NOP poll (conducted 29/30 April) on public attitudes in Greater London. The poll found in terms of voting intention:-

#### (c) MORI (Scotsman 3rd May 1982)

The Scotsman on 3rd May included the results of an MORI poll on attitudes in Scotland. The survey was conducted between April 22nd and 28th. It found a significant increase in Conservative support - up from 18% in February 1982 to 23% in April. Labour support was down from 39% (Feb) to 34%, Alliance support down from 29% to 26% and SNP support up from 14% in February to 17% in April.

On the question of economic prospoects, 25% thought economic conditions in Scotland will improve over the next 12 months (11% Feb 1982), 25% stay the same (20% Feb 1982), 44% get worse (65% Feb 1982) and 6% did not have a view (4% Feb 1982).

When asked about devolution only 22% wanted a 'completely independent Scottish Assembly separate from England', 45% a 'Scottish Assembly as part of Britain but with substantial powers', 27% 'no change from the present system' and 6% had no view.
