## PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTE $127 / 8$

(produced 2nd September 1982)

## 1. Introduction

This edition of Public Opinion Background Note summarises the findings from our latest two 'tracking' studies. Gallup conducted the surveys from 11 th to 16 th August and from the 18 th to 23 rd August. The results of the survey conducted $11 / 16$ August are the same as the results of the Gallup poll published in the Daily Telegraph on 19 th August.

The surveys found very little change in the level of support for the main parties. Conservative support stood at $46 \%$ in early August ( $4 / 9$ August) it fell to $44 \frac{1}{2} \%$ ( $11 / 16$ August) and increased to $45 \frac{1}{2} \%$ ( $18 / 23$ August). These changes show only a small drop in support from the high point of support for the Conservatives reached during the Falklands crisis ( $49 \%-16 / 21$ June). Support for Labour shows no signs of increasing - $28 \%$ of the electorate claimed they would vote for them in the period $4 / 9$ August, $26 \frac{1}{2} \% 11 / 16$ August and $27 \%$ $18 / 23$ August. Social Democrat support has improved after the sharp drop we found in early August when only $13 \frac{1}{2} \%$ of the electorate claimed they would vote for them. In the survey conducted $11 / 16$ August $17 \%$ claimed they would vote for them and $16 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the survey conducted $18 / 23$ August. Support for the Social Democrats remains very close to the trend of support for them that our surveys have shown since mid-May. Support for the Liberals also remains largely unchanged - at around the $10 \%$ mark. Details of the trend in support for the main parties since the start of the year are shown in the table below.

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## 2. Government Record

The popularity of the Government remains high although it has fallen a significant amount since the peak during the Falklands Crisis, when $51 \%$ of the electorate claimed to be satisfied with the record of the Government to date. The latest study found $43 \%$ approving of our record in Government, $43 \%$ disapproving and $14 \%$ with no view. This compares with the situation at the start of the year when only $23 \%$ approved of our record as a Government, 65\% disapproved and $12 \%$ did not have a view.

## 3. Popularity of Political Leaders

Mrs Thatcher's popularity remains very high - $49 \%$ of the electorate claimed to be satisfied with her record as Prime Minister. This compares with a peak at $55 \%$ taking this view during the Falkland Islands Crisis and only $30 \%$ taking this view at the start of the year. Mr Foot's popularity shows no sign of improving - only $13 \%$ of the electorate regard him as a good leader of the Opposition - $74 \%$ as not being a good leader. Mr Steel remains popular - the level of public approval for his leadership has remained remarkably stable since the start of the year.

## 4. Published Polls

(a) Gallup (Daily Telegraph 190 August 1982)

In addition to the standard 'tracking' questions considered above the Daily Telegraph on 19th August 1982 also included the results of some other Gallup questions.

Gallup asked respondents whether they saw Mr Jenkins as likely to be a good leader of the Social Democrats or not. $42 \%$ thought he would be a good leader (50\% July), and $31 \%$ he will not ( $22 \%$ July) and $27 \%$ did not have a view ( $28 \%$ July)

## (b) Gallup (Sunday Telegraph 22nd August 1982)

The Sunday Telegraph on 22nd August included details of a Gallup survey conducted from August 12th to 17 th on attitudes to the police.

Gallup asked 'Have any of the things that have happened recently made you feel uneasy about our police force or hasn't your attitude been affected? Almost four out of ten electors claimed that recent events had affected their attitudes to the police and almost half of these mentioned corruption or the Countryman inquires.

Gallup asked respondents 'Which of these statements do you believe is true in the main, of the British Police Force.' They found:-

There has been a decline in the proportion of the electorate thinking the police are efficient and an increase in the proportion of those thinking there are too many cases of corruption and violence. The younger age group (18-34) is particularly critical of the police - $32 \%$ think that corruption and violence occur too often.

The survey found $55 \%$ of the electorate thinking our system of law and order is efficient and $39 \%$ think it is not. In June 1981 the figures were $46 \%$ and $49 \%$ respectively.
(c) Audience Selection (The Sun 17th August 1982)

The Sun on 17 th August included details of an Audience Selection telephone poll on attitudes to the health service dispute.

The survey found that eight out of ten electors believed that nurses should get more than the $7.9 \%$ rise being offered. However a majority are against strikes and other industrial action.

Two-thirds of those polled thought that the other health workers should also get more than the $6 \%$ they have been offered.
$71 \%$ condemned the Government's handling of the dispute - only $23 \%$ approved.
(d) Research and Marketing (Wales and West) Ltd (HTV 26th August 1982)

HTV on 26th August included results of a Research and Marketing survey in the by-election seat of Gower. The survey found $48 \%$ claiming they would vote Labour, $28 \%$ Conservative, $19 \%$ SDP/Liberal and 5\% Plaid Cymru. This compares with the result of the May 1979 General Election when $53.2 \%$ voted Labour, $30.5 \%$ Conservative, $9.1 \%$ Liberal and $7.2 \%$ Plaid Cymru.

When asked what they regarded as the most important issues facing Britain today, $77 \%$ mentioned unemployment, $26 \%$ inflation, $23 \%$ the economy, $13 \%$ Law and order, $7 \%$ defence/nuclear arms, $6 \%$ housing, $6 \%$ schools/education and $5 \%$ local government/rates.

## (e) Systems Three (Glasgow Herald 26th August 1982)

The Glasgow Herald on 26 th August included details of the results of a Systems Three poll conducted in Scotland in mid-August. The survey found $44 \%$ claiming they would vote Labour, $22 \%$ Conservative, $17 \%$ Liberal/SDP and $16 \%$ SNP. Trend details are shown below:-

## (f) Mapla (Guardian 2nd September 1982)

The Guardian on 2nd September included details of a Maplan poll conducted from August 18 th to August 20th. The survey found $41 \%$ claiming they would vote Conservative, 37\% Labour, 20\% Liberal/SDP and $2 \%$ for other parties. These findings are in conflict with the results of our latest Gallup 'tracking' study and we will need to wait for the results of further surveys before reaching any firm conclusions.
