## 1. Introduction

Gallup completed the interviewing for the latest 'tracking' study in the period 2nd to 7 th June. The survey, conducted in the same way as . Gallup surveys published in the Daily Telegraph found $48 \frac{1}{2} \%$ claiming they will vote Conservative, $23 / \frac{1}{2} \%$ Labour, $14 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Social Democrat and $11 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Liberal. Details of the trend in support since the start of the year are shown in the table below:-

In looking at the trend it is perhaps worth noting the following points:-
a) The continuing upward trend in Conservative support - up from $31.0 \%$ ( $13 / 19$ April) to $48 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the latest study. It is worth noting that only $43.9 \%$ of the electorate voted Conservative in May 1979.
b) The virtual collapse of Labour support. The latest survey found only $23 \frac{1}{2} \%$ claiming they would vote for them. This compares with the $26 \%$ who claimed they would vote Liberal or Social Democrat and the $36.9 \%$ who actually voted Labour in May 1979.
c) The Conservative lead over Labour of 25 percentage points is the highest lead we have had since November 1976 during the last Labour Government.
d) Liberal support appears to have stablised: at around the $10 / 11$ percent level and although showing some minor fluctuations has not increased or decreased drastically since late February.
e) Social Democrat support shows no sign of increasing - it now stands at $14 \frac{1}{2} \%$ ( $2 / 7$ June) compared with $27 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in late March.

The analysis of our 'tracking' study allows us to look at our support among various groups in the electorate. Details are shown below:-

It is worth noting that $53 \%$ of men now claim they will vote Conservative compared with $44 \%$ of women. Support for the Labour party is almost identical among men and women $24 \%$ of men claimed they would vote Labour and $23 \%$ of women. Liberal support is much higher amonst women than men, whilst Social Democrat support is at about the same level among men and women.

Conservative support is highest in the $65+$ age group in which $51 \%$ claimed they would vote Conservative however even in the $18-34$ age group $47 \%$ claimed they would vote Conservative. Labour support is highest in the $45-64$ and $65+$ age groups in which $26 \frac{1}{2} \%$ and $24 \%$ respectively, claimed they would vote Conservative. Liberal support tends to be lowest in the 18-34, $45-64$ and 65+ age groups. Social Democrat support is lowest in the $45-64$ and 65+ age groups

Support for the Conservatives was highest in the ABCl group - $60 \%$ claimed they would vote/ (59\% in May 1979). Labour support is at its lowest in this group and Social Democrat support at its highest. Among skillled workers (C2) $43 \frac{1}{2} \%$ claimed they would vote Conservative ( $41 \%$ May 1979), 25\% Labour, $16 \%$ Social Democrat and $13 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Liberal. In the DE group $38 \%$ claimed they would vote Conservative (34\% May 1979), 36\% Labour, $13 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Liberal and $10 \%$ Social
Democrat.

Even among members of Trade Unions $39 \%$ claimed they would vote Conservative ( $33 \%$ May 1979) $30 \%$ Labour ( $51 \%$ May 1979), $18 \%$ Social Democrat and $12 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Liberal ( $13 \%$ May 1979).

## 2. Government Record

$49 \%$ approved of the record of the Government to date and $39 \%$ disapproved. Details are shown on the following page:-

## 3. Popularity of Political Leaders

Mrs Thatcher's popularity showed a further increase in our latest study - 53\% now claimed to be satisfied with her as Prime Minister. Mr Foot's popularity has fallen even further than the record low point we found last week - only $15 \%$ of the electorate see him as being a good leader of the opposition. Mr Steel's popularity remained almost unchanged

## 4. Published Polls

## a) NOP (Observer 13th June 1982)

The Observer on l3th June included the results of an NOP poll conducted in Coatbridge \& Airdrie on llth June. NOP found $74 \%$ claiming they would vote Labour $15 \%$ Conservative, $7 \%$ SNP and $4 \%$ Alliance.

NOP asked respondents ' Have the events in the Falklands affected the way you intend to vote or have they made no difference' - nine out of ten claimed they had made no difference.
