Allegations Against MPs

PAY CLAIMS

As the 1976/77 pay round gets under way a number of claims will come under close scruting by the Press. They will be looking carefully to see whether any look like breaking the present pay limits. Undoubtedly, Shadow spokesmen will be asked to comment on specific claims, since there will be press speculation about whether we will support potential breaches in the same way that Labour supported the miners during Stage 111.

The line was clearly established at the time of the Seamen's dispute in a statement by Mrs. Thatcher that "if they were to go on strike against the Government's pay policy ... they would receive no aid or comfort whatever from the Conservative Party. The pay policy was approved by Parliament and we cannot help a strike to break that policy in any way".

There is a risk, however, that this line may appear to have been broken if Shadow spokesmen are encouraged to make comments which appear to pre-judge whether particular claims are within the new limits or to suggest that others should be settled beyond the limits. Press reports over the weekend may have given the impression that we were saying that on the one hand the Police should be made a special case and on the other the Miners claim could not be reconciled with the present limits.

It might be helpful to clearly re-establish the original line and to have comments on all future pay claims handled by one Shadow Office in the first instance to ensure consistency.
