Sir Douglas Wass asked me to have a word with Mr Lankester at No. 10 about two points outstanding in the Chancellor's discussion this afternoon with the Prime Minister.

ITV Levy

2. After talking to Mr Martin, I told Mr Lankester that the Treasury and the Home Office had in hand an exercise to take a fundamental look at the structure of the levy. Whilst this might well take some months, it was clearly not sensible simply to put up the rate as a short-term budgetary measure, particularly given the effect of the present levy in transferring a large portion of the companies' marginal costs on to the Exchequer. I confirmed that an increase would require separate legislation.

VAT on advertising

After consulting Mr Howard at Customs and Excise, I confirmed that VAT applied comprehensively to advertising expenditure, including advertising on television, with the sole exception of newspaper advertising. The latter had been excluded for political reasons, and because it had always been thought that applying the tax to classified advertising would hit particularly hard some of the small provincial newspapers. Charging companies display advertising in the press would, of course, raise little new money because the advertisers would be able to reclaim the input tax when they remitted their output tax.
