## PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTES 151/152

 (produced 3rd March 1983)
## 1. Introduction

This edition of Public Opinion Background Note gives details of two Gallup tracking studies - one conducted from 17th to 21st February - before the Bermondsey by-election and the second from 24th to 28th February - largely after the Bermondsey by-election.

Details of the results of our two unpublished 'tracking' studies and two published studies are shown below:-

ORC conducted a survey for Weekend World on Friday 25 th February which found almost no change in Conservative support when compared with the results of our Gallup study conducted before Bermondsey (17/21 Feb). Our tracking study conducted largely after Bermondsey found a fall in Conservative support (42\%) but not as large as found by the MORI survey published in the Sunday Times on 27 th February which found $39 \%$ claiming they would vote Conservati ve. All three post-Bermondsey surveys found a sharp increase in Alliance support - Gallup ( $24 / 28 \mathrm{Feb}$ ) up to $27 \%$, O RC ( 25 Feb ) up to $23 \%$ and MORI ( $25 / 26 \mathrm{Feb}$ ) up to $34 \%$. Labour support fell in all three studies.

Transposing the Gallup results into seats would give a large Conservative majority but with the Alliance having about 30 seats.

Two polls have been conducted in Darlington - details are shown below.

The two surveys found significant differences in levels of support for the Parties NOP found Conservative and Alliance 'neck and neck' with Labour in third place and MORI found Labour with a significant lead, and Conservatives and Alliance very close.

The two tables overleaf show the trend of support for the main parties nationally since September 1982 - the first shows support when 'don't knows' are excluded (the 'conventional' way of presenting opinion research findings) and the second shows the figures when don't knows are included. In the latest study Gallup found $12 \%$ of respondents who did not give a voting intention or claimed they did not know how they would vote.

## 2. Government Record

Our latest two surveys found no change in the level of popularity of the Government - our latest study (conducted $24 / 25 \mathrm{Feb}$ ) found $39 \%$ claiming to approve of the record of the Government, $49 \%$ disapprove and $12 \%$ did not have a view.

Details of the trend of replies to this standard question since early September 1982 are shown below:-

## 3. Popularity of Political Leaders

Our two latest studies have found almost no change in the level of approval for Mrs Thatcher and Mr Foot, but a slight improvement in the popularity of Mr Steel and Mr Jenkins.

Details of the trend of approval/disapproval for the leaders of the main parties since early September 1982 are shown in the table below:-

## 4. Published Polls

## (a) MORI (Sunday Times 27th February 1983)

In addition to the voting intention question, the MORI study published in the Sunday Times on 27 th February (conducted 25/26 February) asked 'Do you think Michael Foot should remain leader of the Labour Party or should he resign?' $58 \%$ thought he should resign, $32 \%$ remain as leader and $10 \%$ had no view. MORI also asked 'If Michael Foot decided to resign, who do you think would make the best leader?' $47 \%$ selected Healey, $8 \%$ Benn, $4 \%$ Kinnock, $4 \%$ Shore and 3\% Hattersley.

## (b) ORC (Weekend World 27th February 1983)

Weekend World on 27 th February 1983 included details of an ORC poll conducted on 25 th February. In addition to the standard voting intention question (considered above) ORC asked respondents what they thought of Mr Foot's leadership of the Labour Party. $6 \%$ thought 'his leadership is very good', $29 \%$ 'fairly good', $27 \%$ 'fairly bad' and $30 \%$ 'very bad'. They also asked who would be the best leader of Labour for a General Election $\rightarrow 43 \%$ selected Healey, 10\% Foot, 9\% Benn, 7\% Kinnock, 7\% Shore, 5\% Hattersley and 4\% Silkin. $33 \%$ claimed they would be more likely to vote Labour if Denis Healey was Labour leader, 9\% claimed they would be less likely to vote Labour and 52\% claimed this would make no difference.

## (c) Gallup (Guardian 7th March 1983)

The Guardian on 7 th March included details of a Gallup survey conducted for the Association of University Teachers between February 16th and 22nd. They asked respondents whether they thought the Government was spending too much, too little or about the right amount on education, health, roads, defence and old age pensions. They found:-
