PRIVATE OPINION RESEARCH

Over the past week the party has conducted two 'quickie' surveys - the results have been report at the various daily campaign meetings. Copies of the ORC (Harris) reports on these surveys (conducted 24th and 26th May) are attached. In terms of overall support for the parties our two studies found no significant differences from the published polls and the 26th May survey did not confirm the possible upsurge in Alliance support that was indicated in our study conducted on 21/22 May.

Copies of the ORC (Harris) reports on these surveys are attached - I would particularly draw your attention to the following points:-

- there is a danger of complacency. 10% of Conservative voters think that the Party's current big lead may 'make people less likely to go and vote.'
- 21% of voters think that Animal Welfare is worthy of consideration in deciding how to vote, including one in six Conservative voters.
- there has been no increase this week in the percentage of voters blaming the Conservative Government for the level of unemployment. The Government and world economic conditions are most often blamed while the percentage blaming the Trade Unions has increased slightly.
- very few electors (16%) expect the health service to improve under a Conservative Government and only 23% expect education to improve.

SUMMARY

- Overwhelmingly voters expect the Conservatives to win the General Election - 77% overall, 93% of Conservatives, 82% of Alliance and 59% of Labour voters.
- 2. In Monday's Guardian there was a report that the Labour Party was Shifting the emphasis of its campaign to constituency level because polls were showing that Labour voters were more optimistic aBout winning their constituency. This is confirmed but is no more than would be expected. A more detailed analysis will follow.
- 3. VEry few people (16% of voters) expect the health service to improve under a Conservative Government and 23% expect Education to improve. The large majority of those thinking both will get worse are Labour or Alliance supporters.
- 4. 61% of all voters including 85% of Conservatives, 41% of Labour and 51% of Alliance voters believe the Conservatives the most united of the three main parties.

Summary

1. Conservatives are weak on old age pensions.

More people (41%) think they have gone up <u>less</u> than the rate of inflation including 27% of Conservatives while 31% think they have gone up more than the rate of inflation.

46% of voters think Labour would do most to help pensioners while 27% think the Conservatives would do most.

- 2. There has been no increase this week in the % of voters blaming the Conservative Government for the level of unemployment. The Government and world economic conditions are most often blamed while the % blaming Trade Unions has increased somewhat.
- 3. There is a danger of complacency. 10% of Conservative voters think that the Party's current big lead may "make people less likely to go and vote."
- 4. The poll shows that while Mrs Thatcher has impressed people favourably rather than unfavourably during the campaign both Mr Foot and Mr Jenkins have had overwhelmingly the reverse effect. There is further evidence that Mr Steel has been making a very favourable impression.
- 5. 21% of voters think that Animal Welfare is worthy of consideration in deciding how to vote including one in six Conservative voters. There is a need for sensitivity on this issue.
- 6. More people (48%) think "the economy is gradually improving and will continue to do so than disagree (32%) with the proposition.
