PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTE 122 (produced 18th July 1982)

1. Introduction

The results of our latest 'tracking' study are the same as the results of the Gallup survey published in the Daily Telegraph on 15th July 1982. The interviewing for the survey was conducted from 7th to 12th July and Gallup interviewed over 900 electors throughout Great Britain. The survey found 46½% claiming they would vote Conservative (45% in previous published poll - 9/14 June), 27½% Labour (25% in previous published poll), 16½% Social Democrat (18½% in previous published poll) and 7½% Liberal (10% in previous published poll). If we compare the results of this latest published poll with the previous unpublished study (conducted 30th June to 5th July) we find a slight increase in Conservative Labour and Social Democrat support, and a sharp fall in Liberal support. Compared with the start of the year Liberal /Social Democratic support has fallen from 42% to 24%. Details of the trend in support for the parties are shown on the following page.

2. Government Record

For the third week running, Gallup found no change in the level of approval for the record of the Government - 47% approved (23% in early January 1982) and 41% disapproved (65% early January 1982). Details of the trend are shown on the following page.

3. Popularity of Political Leaders

Gallup found almost no change in the popularity of the leaders of the Conservative, Labour and Liberal parties. 52% claimed to be satisfied with Mrs Thatcher as Prime Minister (30% at the start of the year). They found only 16% claiming to be satisfied with Mr Foot as Leader of Opposition - 20% at the start of the year. 61% claimed to be satisfied with Mr Steel as Leader of the Liberals (62% at the start of the year).

Gallup also asked "Do you think Mr Jenkins will or will not prove a good leader of the Social Democratic Party?" 50% thought he will be a good leader, 22% he will not and 28% did not have a view.
