1. Proposed Business for the Week 11-15th October

On Monday, 11th October, there would be the Second Reading of the Weights and Measures (Ro.2) Bill followed by a Motion on the Counter-Infletion (Price Code) Order.

On Tuesday, 12th October, and Wednesday, 13th October, there would be the Remaining Stages of the Health Services Bill.

On Thursday, 14th October, there would be the Report and Third Reading of the Electricity (Pinancial Provisions) (Scotland) Bill and of the Maplin Development Authority (Dissolution) Bill. This would be followed by consideration of Lords Amendments to the Armed Forces Bill and by resumed debate on the Second Reading of the Public Lending Right Bill. If there was time there would follow progress on the Remaining Stages of the Road Traffic (Seat Belts) Bill.

On Friday, 15th October, there would be completion of the Remaining Stages of the Road Traffic (Seat Belts) Bill, a Debate on the Green Paper on a Proposed New Highway Code and the Second Reading of the Endangered Species (Import and Export) Bill.

2. Matters arising from business

Mr. Lamont reported that a reasoned amendment had been drafted for the Second Reading of the Weights and Measures (No.2) Bill on 11th October. It deplored the imadequate preparation for the Bill and the absence of adequate safeguards regarding the enforcing of metrication, and also the fact that the Bill went further than the requirements of the relevant

REC directive, and therefore suggested that the House should decline to give the Bill a Second Reading. There was a discussion after which it was agreed that, in view of the feeling in the Party we would not down the amendment.

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There was a preliminary discussion about coming business in the House of Lords. It was agreed that:

- (i) It would not be desirable for the Lords to reject the British Transport Docks (Felixstowe) Bill as the Lords Select Committee had voted to let it go forward.

- (iii) Any other suggested amendments needed to be communicated to Mr. Maude or Mr. Patten by the close of Monday, 9th August.

5. Other business
