Thank you for your letter of 5th March regarding the SCUA Centenary Year 1982, which followed our telephone conversation.


I will put your proposals to the Prime Minister as soon as possible and I will be in touch with your shortly thereafter.

Dear Derek, SCUA CENTENARY YEAR - 1982

The Scottish Conservative and Unionist Association celebrates its centenary next year and, as I told you on the phone, a Committee has been formed, under the Chairmanship of Mr David Mitchell, the President elect, to consider a programme of activities. A copy of Bulletin No. 1 is attached for your information.

You are aware of the criticism and disappointment over the decision to hold the Prime Minister's Scottish Conference Rally on the Friday evening and not a Saturday afternoon last year and again in May of this year. Although the Committee's proposition for Centenary Year was for a Saturday afternoon, I am pleased to say that their recommendation is now in support of Friday evening and that it should be followed by a big Ceilidh rather than the President's Dinner and the Agents Ball, provided the Prime Minister will attend. This is a real step forward and since I believe the Ceilidh is an imaginative idea, I hope the idea will be supported.

The Committee also request and hope for two other visits from the Prime Minister during the year. It is their intention to hold a St Andrews Night Dinner in Glasgow - hopefully attended by 500/600 supporters. Unfortunately St Andrews Night (30th November) in 1982 falls on a Tuesday which would not be suitable to the Prime Minister. Since they are most anxious that Mrs Thatcher should be the principal guest, I am sure they would change it to the preceding Friday, Saturday or Monday but an early decision would be required since the number of venues capable of catering for that number are very limited and quickly become booked.

The third function they have in mind is for a large Fete in the North East of Scotland in early September in the week Mrs Thatcher will be going to Balmoral.

As you will see the intention is to have major functions in different centres in Scotland with the Prime Minister in Perth, Glasgow and the North East. Lord Home is probably being invited to be the principal guest at the Burns Supper in January and the further suggestion is that Mr Harold Macmillan and Mr Edward Heath are also invited to additional functions in Scotland during the year. I hope I have scotched the suggestion that the three former Conservative Prime Ministers and Mrs Thatcher are present at the same function.

I would welcome your observations and, of course, early confirmation that at least two and hopefully all three of these invitations are acceptable to Mrs Thatcher.
