1. Introduction

Perhaps the most remarkable feature of our latest Gallup "tracking" study conducted from 18th to 23rd June is the lack of change in Labour's lead - this has dropped from 4½% in the previous week (11/16 June) to 4% in the latest study. Liberal support is back to the level it reached at the start of June.

Voting Intention

Full details of the trend in support for the main parties in recent weeks from both published Gallup polls and our unpublished Gallup "tracking" studies are shown both in the table below and in the attached graphs.

5. The Centre Party

A Marplan poll published in the Sun on Friday June 27th asked respondents what they thought of Roy Jenkin's Centre Party. They found 55% of electors thinking that it would look after their interests worse than the present parties 17% thought a new Centre Party would look after their interests the same as the existing parties and 28% better.

Issues

In recent tracking studies we have been asking our respondents for their views on a range of current issues in terms of whether the issues make them more favourably inclined towards the Government, less favourably inclined or they make no difference. The issues we include in this question are based on the answers to our standard open ended tracking question "Over the last 7 days have you seen or heard anything that has made you feel more favourably or less favourably inclined towards the Government". Details of the answers we have obtained in the past three weeks are shown on page 4.

In our latest study the only issue area in which we have a lead is with regard to the Government's policy on Trade Union Reform. The lead we had with regard to policy on the Common Market in early June has completely disappeared.
