Summary

Sent MT to Ian Gow, 24 Aug.

- *Observer* (n.d.) "How not to hit perks" (first leader). Inland Revenue proposals on company cars would hit those earning less than £8,500 who got least from budget cuts, lower and middle management. Would increase already complex system. Way forward is to reduce the effective tax rate and remove exemptions. MT not keen on removing exemptions.
- *Daily Mirror* (24 Aug): "Thatcher drives a hard bargain" (Terence Lancaster column). Inland Revenue proposals on company cars causing "horror in every golf club in the

Home Counties", and some further north. Denis Thatcher owns a Rolls-Royce. Most company car drivers voted Conservative at General Election, Lancaster assumes. This then a "Tory betrayal" of its own.

• *Financial Times* (24 Aug): "Basil and the perks crisis" (Lombard column) Anxious spoof letter about Inland Revenue proposal from fictional company-owning nephew Basil to his tax-exile uncle Tom, who writes back from company yacht off Cannes. Gist = proposals would increase costs to companies and drive some overseas.
