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PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTE 72 (produced 12th July 1981)

1. Introduction

Gallup conducted the interviews for our latest 'tracking' studies from 1st until 6th July throughout Great Britain and interviewed almost 1,000 electors. On the basis used for the publication of the results of Gallup polls in the <u>Daily Telegraph</u> our latest survey found a 9% Labour lead compared with 11% in the previous week (24/30 June) and 8% in the last published Gallup poll (conducted 9/15 June). The latest study found no signs of an upsurge of national support for the Liberals, Social Democrats or a Liberal-Social Democrat Alliance. At a comparative point into the 1970-1974 (Feb) Government in June 1972 Gallup found a 6% Labour lead (10% said they would vote Liberal), by July 1972 this lead had increased the 10% (9½% said they would vote Liberal) and in August 1972 it was 9% (7½% said they would vote Liberal).

Support for the Conservatives, when don't knows are included as a separate category showed almost no change - 26% 24/30 June and 27% 1/6 July. Support for Labour almost remained a constant -35½% 24/30 June and 35% 1/6 July. Support for the Liberals fell from 15% 24/30 to 12% 1/6 July and support for the Social Democrats remained almost constant, 10½% 24/30 June and 11% 1/6 July. When Gallup asked respondents how they would vote if a Social Democrat candidate stood in their constituency Gallup again found almost no change in the level of support for the Conservative, Labour and Social Democrat parties - support for the Liberals fell. When asked how they would vote if a Social Democrat-Liberal candidate stood in their constituency our latest tracking study found almost no change in the level of support for the Conservative and Labour parties. Gallup found a slight fall in support for the Social Democrat-Liberals.

Over the last week we have had the results of two polls conducted in Warrington published. The table below shows the results of the voting intention question from these two surveys.

5. Published Polls

(a) Gallup Warrington Poll (Daily Telegraph 7th July 1981)

The results of a Gallup poll conducted in Warrington between July 2nd and 4th was published in the <u>Daily Telegraph</u> on July 7th. It found 62% of respondents claiming they would vote Labour, 27½% Social Democrat, 9% Conservative and 1½% for 'other' parties.

Gallup asked these respondents who claimed they would vote Social Democrat which Party they had voted for previously - 29% said they had supported the Conservatives, 48% that they had supported Labour, 11% the Liberals and the remainder other parties or that they had not supported any party.

Only 58% of the electorate claimed they would definitely vote on 16th July.

When asked which local issue they considered to be the most important unemployment (57%) was top of the list followed by education (13%), housing (9%) and rates (8%).

(b) NOP Warrington Poll (Observer, 12th July 1981)

The results of a NOP poll conducted in Warrington between July 8th and 9th was published in The Observer on 12th July. 60% of

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those interviewed claimed they would vote Labour, 29% Social Democrat, 10% Conservative and 1% for 'other' parties.

NOP found the issues worrying the Warrington electors included unemployment (mentioned by 69%), inflation (39%), and education (28%).

(c) <u>Audience Selection</u> (<u>The Sun</u>, July 8th 1981)

An Audience Selection poll conducted by telephone on 6th July 1981 and published in <u>The Sun</u> on July 8th 1981 looked at attitudes to the riots. Audience Selection found the electorate expects further trouble and were concerned that it would involve the area in which they live. Respondents blamed unemployment among young people for the violence - 95% mentioned this. Eight out of ten of the respondents also criticised parents for failing to discipline their children. 66% of electors blamed racial tension, and 57% teachers for failing to impose enough discipline in schools.

The electorate was generally in favour of tougher measures to counter riots:-

- 68% thought water canons would be effective
- 57% thought police should have power to order curfews
- 42% thought the amy should be used to quell riots.
