## PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTE 101

## 1. Introduction

The results from our latest Gallup 'tracking' study are the same as the results of the Gallup poll published in the Daily Telegraph on 18th February. The interviewing for this study was conducted from 10 th to 15 th February and Gallup found $27 \frac{1}{2} \%$ claiming they would vote Conservative (compared with $27 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the previous published Gallup poll conducted $13 / 18$ January), 34\% Labour ( $29 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in previous published poll), $14 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Liberal ( $13 \%$ in previous published poll) and $21 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Social Democrat ( $26 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in previous published poll).

Looking at the results of the latest study in terms of the trend of support for the main parties in our weekly unpublished tracking studies, Conservative support has increased slightly since the start of the year - up from $23 \%$ 9/14 December to $27 \frac{1}{2} \% 10 / 15$ February. In terms of past trend, it is back to the level it was in late October 1981. Labour support has increased by over 10 percentage points since the end of 1981 - up from $23 \frac{1}{2} \%$ ( $9 / 14$ December) to $34 \%$ ( $10 / 15$ February). Liberal support in the latest study remains unchanged when compared with our last study in $1981-14 \frac{1}{2} \%$ at both times. Social Democrat support has collapsed from $36 \%$ ( $9 / 14$ December) to $21 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the latest study ( $10 / 15$ February). This puts them back at the level of support they had in early October 1981. It would be reasonable to assume that the drop in Social Democrat support and the rise in Labour support has involved a switch from Social Democrat to Labour.

The downward trend in support for the Social Democrats that we found in our tracking study was confirmed by a Marplan survey conducted in late January which found $34 \%$ claiming they will vote Conservative, $32 \%$ Labour and $29 \%$ for the two Alliance parties.

## 2. Government Record

Our latest study found a slight fall in the level of approval of the record of the Government. We found $24 \%$ approving of our record and $66 \%$ disapproving. Details are shown on the following page.

## 4. Published Polls

(a) Gallup (Daily Telegraph 18th February 1982)

In addition to the standard questions on voting intention, the Gallup poll published in the Daily Telegraph on 18 th February and conducted $10 / 15$ February the survey included the standard Gallup question on what electors regard as the most urgent problems facing the country. Details of the findings are shown below:-

Looking forward to the Budget in three weeks' time, one in two ( 46 per cent) think the Government will increase taxation, while 15 percent think it will be decreased. The remainder either think taxes will be left as they are ( 35 per cent) or are undecided 4 per cent).

One in two ( 49 per cent) of the public would prefer Government services to be extended even if more taxes had to be imposed as a consequence, 26 per cent would like to leave things as they are, and 21 per cent would cut taxes even if this mean cuts in services.

Gallup then asked people whether they agreed or disagreed with a number of statements relating to the Government's taxation policy.

(b) Marplan (BBC Newsnight 19th February 1982)

A Marplan poll conducted at the end of January found $34 \%$ claiming they will vote Conservative, $32 \%$ Labour and $29 \%$ Alliance. Marplan found $65 \%$ in favour of the introduction of proportional representation.
