## PUBLIC OPINION BACKGROUND NOTE 103

(produced 6th March 1982)

## 1. Introduction

The latest Gallup tracking study conducted from 24 th February to 1 st March found a sharp increase in Conservative support, a very slight drop in Labour support, almost no change in Social Democrat support and a sharp fall in Liberal support. We will need to await the results of further surveys before attempting to draw any major conclusions with regard to the upward trend in support for the Conservative Party.

The latest study found $32.5 \%$ claiming they would vote Labour ( $331 / 2 \% 17 / 22 \mathrm{Feb}$ ) , $31 \%$ Conservative ( $26 \frac{1}{2} \% 17 / 22 \mathrm{Feb}$ ), $22 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Social Democrat $(22 \% 17 / 22 \mathrm{Feb})$ and $11 \%$ Liberal ( $14 \% 17 / 22 \% \mathrm{Feb}$ ). The combined level of Social Democrat and Liberal support is down from $36 \%(17 / 22 \mathrm{Feb})$ to $33 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the latest study - these figures compred with $51 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the week 2/7 December. 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## 2. Government Record

The latest study found almost no change in the level of approval for the record of the Government - $23 \%$ approved ( $22 \% 17 / 22 \mathrm{Feb}$ ) and $63 \%$ disapproved ( $66 \% 17 / 22$ Feb). Details are shown below

4. Published Polls
(a) MORI (Daily Star 3rd March 1982)

An MORI poll published in the Daily Star on 3rd March found 30\% claiming they would vote Conservative, $33 \%$ Labour, $12 \%$ Liberal, $11 \%$ SDP, $11 \%$ Alliance and $3 \%$ for 'other parties'. The poll was conducted from 18 th to 22nd February.
(b) NOP (Daily Mail 4th March 1982)

An NOP poll conducted on 3rd March and published in the Daily Mail on 4th March asked respondents "Do you approve or disapprove of the cricketers' action (in going to South Africa) or are you not concerned about it?" $47 \%$ approved, $21 \%$ disapproved, $29 \%$ were not concerned and $3 \%$ did not answer. NOP also asked "Do sporting links with South Africa help support the apartheid system, or do they help black South Africans?" $19 \%$ thought sporting links help support apartheid, $47 \%$ sporting links help blacks and $34 \%$ did not know. When asked about taking disciplinary action against the cricketers who went to South Africa, NOP found $74 \%$ believed they should not be banned from playing in an English Test team again.
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(c) MORI (Scotsman 3rd and 4th March 1982)

The Scotsman on 3 rd and 4 th March included details of an MORI poll conducted in Scotland only between 16th and 24th February. Details of the voting intention trend are shown below:-

MORI asked respondents "Who would make the best Scottish Secretary" - $18 \%$ selected George Younger, 26\% Bruce Millar, 15\% Russell Johnston and $41 \%$ did not have a view
(d) Gallup (Daily Telegraph 8th March 1982)

The Daily Telegraph on 8th March included details of a series of Gallup polls conducted in five European countries and the USA last month. The polls looked at attitudes to the presence of U.S. troops and weapons in Europe and attitudes to US leadership of the Western Alliance. Gallup asked "In general, how much confidence do you have in the United States to deal wisely with world problems a great deal, a fair amount, not very much or none at all. They found:-

$60 \%$ of respondents in Great Britain claimed to have 'not very much', or 'no confidence at all' in the United States leadership - in France 47\% gave the same replies, in West Germany $40 \%$, in Italy $29 \%$, in Belgium $30 \%$, in Switzerland $63 \%$ and in Denmark $48 \%$. $35 \%$ of the British electorate claimed to have a great deal' or 'a fair amount' of confidence in US leadership - $40 \%$ gave this answer in France, $57 \%$ in West Germany, $53 \%$ in Italy, $45 \%$ in Belgium, $33 \%$ in Switzerland and $38 \%$ in Denmark.

When asked about attitudes to U.S. nuclear weapons and U.S. troops in Europe, Gallup found $42 \%$ of the British electorate thought the presence of U.S. nuclear missiles increased chances of attack, $29 \%$ they provide greater protection and $24 \%$ their presence has no effect. When asked about the presence of U.S. troops $25 \%$ thought their presence increases chances of attack, $24 \%$ provides greater protection, and $46 \%$ has no effect.

When asked whether they thought it would be better to fight than accept Russian domination - in Britain $12 \%$ thought we should accept domination and $75 \%$ thought we should fight.

Gallup found that in the event of an attack on Western Europe that many electors have doubts about NATO's defence capabilities. In G.B. $56 \%$ claimed to have 'a greater deal' or a 'fair amount' of confidence in NATO.

(e) MORI (Observer 7th March 1982)

The results of an MORI poll conducted between 18 th and 22nd February for the campaign for Lead-free Air found $91 \%$ of the electorate claiming they believed lead in petrol was a potential health hazard. $89 \%$ claimed they thought lead in petrol should be banned. When asked "Do you think the Government should introduce a law to ensure that all petrol sold in Britain is lead-free, even if this would put up petrol prices by a few pence per gallon-" - 77\% said 'yes' $15 \%$ 'no' and $8 \%$ did not give an answer.

## (f) Systems Three (Glasgow Herald 9th March 1982)

A Systems Three poll conducted in Glasgow Hillhead on $6 / 7$ March found $32 \%$ claiming they will vote Labour, 31\% Conservative, $25 \%$ Alliance and $11 \%$ SNP - after don't knows had been eliminated. They found $30 \%$ of respondents claiming they did not know how they would vote - an extremely high figure, even for a by-election poll.
