FOLLOWING FOR PRIVATE SECRETARY.

THE PRIME MINISTER: POSSIBLE INTERVIEW WITH DIE WELT

1. DR RAINER BARZEL, DEFEATED CHARCELLOR CANDIDATE FOR THE CDU/CSU IN 1972. ASKED TO SEE ME AND CAME FOR A TETE-A-TETE LUNCH TODAY. THE OBJECT OF HIS CALL WAS TO ENQUIRE WHETHER THE PRIME MINISTER WOULD BE PROPARED TO GIVE AN IN DEPTH INTERVIEW FOR QUOTE DIE WELT UNQUOTE, AT WHICH HE WOULD BE THE INTERVIEWER. THE BACKGROUND, AS HE EXPLAINED IT, WAS THAT THE PRIME MINISTER'S VICTORY AT THE POLLS AND HER ASSUMPTION OF THE OFFICE OF PRIME MINISTER HAD ARGUSED IMMENSE INTEREST IN THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY AND MER SUBSEQUENT POLICIES HAD BEEN FOLLOWED WITH SYMPATHY AND HOPE THAT THEY WOULD SUCCEED. THE IDEA WOULD BE THAT THE PRIME MINISTER SHOULD BE GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY OF EXPLAINING HER POLICIES IN THE BROADEST SENSE OVER THE WIDEST FIELD BY QUESTION AND ANSWER. ALTHOUGH THERE WOULD ALSO BE SOME EDITORIAL DESCRIPTIVE MATTER-PLACE OF INTERVIEW, WHAT THE PM WAS WEARING ETC. DR BARZEL WOULD BE PREPARED TO SUBMIT THE QUESTIONS SEFORE HAND. HE WOULD COME TO LONDON TO DO THE INTERVIEW TOGETHER WITH AN INTERPRETER. HIS PREFERRED TIME WOULD BE LETWEEN 14 AND 21 OCTOBER ALTHOUGH THERE WOULD NATURALLY SE LATITUDE TO SUIT THE PRIME MINISTER'S CONVENIENCE. I UNDERTOOK TO TRANSMIT THE REQUEST BUT MADE IT CLEAR. THAT I COULD IN NO WAY ANTICIPATE THE PRIME MINISTER'S DECISION. 2. I SUPPORT THIS PROPOSAL FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS. I THINK IT WOULD BE WHOLLY IN THE NATIONAL INTEREST FOR THE COMPREHENSIVE ACCOUNT OF THE PURPOSES AND INTENTIONS OF HER MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT TO BE VIDELY PUBLISHED IN THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC FROM THE HIGHEST AUTHORITATIVE SOURCE. QUOTE DIE WELT UNQUOTE IS ONE OF THE THREE MOST WIDELY CIRCULATED SERIOUS PAPERS IN THE FRG (THE OTHERS ARE THE QUOTE FRANKFURTER ALLGEMEINE ZEITUNG UNQUOTE AND THE QUOTE

SUEDDEUTSCHE ZEITUNG UMGUOTE). MOREOVER IT HAS A PARTICULAR COMMECTION WITH BRITAIN SINCE IT WAS GRIGINALLY LICENSED AFTER THE WAR IN THE DRITISH ZONE. ITS MEAREST EQUIVALENT IN THE UK IS, I SUPPOSE, THE QUOTE DAILY TELEGRAPH UNQUOTE, EGTH IN FORMAT AND EDITORIAL POLICY, ALTHOUGH IT IS NITH QUOTE THE TIMES UNQUOTE, QUOTE LE MONDE UNQUOTE AND QUOTE LA STAMPA UNQUOTE THAT IT PROGUCES A JOINT MONTHLY EUROPA SUPPLEMENT. THE CHMER, AXEL SPRINGER, IS ARGUABLY THE MOST IMPORTANT AND INFLUENTIAL PUBLISHER IN GERMANY. DR BARZEL CAN, IN MY JUDGEMENT, BE RELIED ON BOTH TO PUT THE QUESTIONS AND PRESENT THE ANSWERS FAIRLY. MOREOVER THE TIMING IS RIGHT, SINCE AN IN-DEPTH INTERVIEW OF THIS SORT WOULD PROVIDE AN ADMIRABLE CURTAIN RAISER TO THE PRIME MINISTER'S FORTHCOMING VISIT AT THE END OF OCTOBER.

- 3. THE ARQUMENTS ARE NOT OF COURSE ALL ON ONE SIDE. DR BARZEL, ALTHOUGH FOR HEALTH REASONS NO LONGER IN THE FIRSTFLIGHT OF FEDERAL POLITICIAMS, IS STILL AN IMPORTANT MEMBER OF THE CDU AND OF THE BUNDESTAG. THE CONSERVATIVE VICTORY IN THE UK WAS WIDELY ACCLAIMED HERE AS A FILLIP FOR THE CDU/CSU, AND STRAUSS HAS CLAIMED TO BE QUOTE THE GERMAN MRS THATCHER UNQUOTE. THERE IS ALREADY SOMETHING OF A PRE-ELECTORAL ATMOSPHERE HERE, WITH SOME FAIRLY HEAVY FIRE BEING EXCHANGED BETWEEN STRAUSS AND LEADERS OF THE SPD EG DARR. IT COULD BE HELD THAT IF THE PRICE MINISTER WERE INTERVIEWED BY DR BARZEL IN A STRONGLY ANTI-SPD PAPER (WHICH DIE WELT IS) IT MIGHT CLOUD HERE RELATIONSHIP WITH THE FEBERAL CHANCELLOR WHICH, OF COURSE, MUST HAVE PRICRITY.
- FEDERAL ELECTIONS ARE STILL A YEAR ANAY, AND IN COULD NOT REASONABLY BE MAINTAINED THAT ANY INTERVIEW THE PRIME MINISTER GAVE TO AN OPPOSITION POLITICIAN COULD SIGNIFICANTLY INFLUENCE THEM AT THIS DISTANCE. IT SHOULD BE POSSIBLE FOR THE PRIME MINISTER TO AVOID ISSUES WHICH ARE A MATTER OF PARTY POLITICAL CONTROVERSY HERE. MOREOVER IF THE INTERVIEW TOOK PLACE AND WERE PUBLISHED IN ADVANCE OF THE PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT HERE ON 31 OCTOBER, HER DISCUSSIONS AND PRESS COMPERENCE WITH CHANCELLOR SCHMIDT WOULD CANCEL OUT ANY RESIDUAL PARTY POLITICAL ADVANTAGE FOR THE OPPOSITION.

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5. ASVERT, ELESS IF, AS I HUPE, THE PRIME MINISTER IS WILLING TO WEET DR DARZEL'S REQUEST, IT LOULD DE WISE IF SHE WERE TO CLEAR HER LINES WITH THE CHAMCELLOR FIRST. I THINK THIS COULD BEST LE DONE INFORMALLY BY A TELEPHONE CALL FROM THE PRIME MINISTER'S PRIVATE SECRETARY TO RUHFUS IN THE KANZLERAMT, RATHER THAN THROUGH THIS EMBASSY. IT COULD BE EXPLAINED TO PURFUS THAT THE PRIME MINISTER WELCOMED THE OPPORTUNITY OF GIVING THIS INTERVIEW, WHICH SHE BELIEVED WOULD BE HELPFUL IN TERMS OF EXPLAINING UK POLICIES TO THE GERMAN PUBLIC. SHE WOULD OF COURSE BE CAREFUL TO AVOID ANY IMPRESSION OF TAKING SIDES IN GERMAN INTERNAL POLITICS. BUT SHE WOULD NOT WISH TO SO AHEAD IF THE CHANCELLOR THOUGHT THAT THE INTERVIEW MIGHT GAUSE HIM ARY POLITICAL EMBARRASSMENT. I BELIEVE THAT A MESSAGE ALONG THESE LINES WOULD EFFECTIVELY DISARM THE CHANCELLOR AND THAT THE CHANCES OF HIS RAISING ANY OBJECTION TO THE INTERVIEW WOULD BE VERY SLIGHT. BUT, AS HE TOLD HE AT DINNER THE OTHER NIGHT (MY) LETTER TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF 20 SEPTEMBER). HE BELIEVES THAT THE ESSENTIAL THING FOR RELATIONS OF CONFIDENCE DETNEEN HEADS OF GOVERNMENT IS THAT THEY SHOULD BE COMPLETELY FRANK WITH ONE ANOTHER. AN APPROACH ON THESE LINES WOULD SHOW THAT THE PRIME MINISTER WAS ACTING IN THE SAME BELIEF. 5. IN SHORT, I CONSIDER THAT THE ADVANTAGES TO THE NATIONAL

6. IN SHORT, I CONSIDER THAT THE ADVANTAGES TO THE NATIONAL INTEREST OF ACCEDING TO DR. EARZEL'S REQUEST CONSIDERABLY OUTHERS ANY QUALKS, AND THAT THESE QUALMS CAN BE SET AT REST IN THE MANNER I HAVE SUGGESTED.

Possible Interview by Prime Minister With "Die Welt"

We discussed on the telephone the recommendation conveyed in Bonn telegram 543 that the Prime Minister should accept an invitation to give an interview to Dr Rainer Barzel on behalf of "Die Welt".

The arguments in favour of accepting the invitation as well as the possible pitfalls, are well set out in the Bonn telegram, with which we agree. I know that so far the Prime Minister has not given any interviews of this kind. Nevertheless from the point of view of the continued improvement of relations between the UK and the FRG, at what is a most convenient moment for putting our views firmly on record, we consider it would be very useful if the Prime Minister felt able to accept this invitation.

As for the question which Sir Oliver Wright raises whether the Prime Minister should give an interview to a leading member of the CDU (opposition) party (paragraph 3 of the telegram), we agree with the suggestion that the best way round the problem would be for you to have a word, on the Prime Minister's behalf, on the telephone with Jurgen Ruhfus. But, if you would prefer, we could, of course, ask Sir Oliver to do this instead.

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PRIME MINISTER

I have requests from German Television (ZDF) and from Die Welt for interviews pre-Bonn. FCO advice is that if you are willing, these are both splendid outlets.

The format for television would be "Meet the Press" style with two German reporters based in London. Die Welt would be an interview with Dr Rainer Barzel.

As I wrote pre-Rome, I hope in due course a pattern may evolve whereby you contrive to meet the indigenous press (that based in London) to set the scene, and I am sure Bernard Ingham will take this up with you in due course, but we have not yet established this style - indeed pressure has been such that your pre-visit briefing has come too late to make it sensible.

For the particular visit to Bonn I advise against. This is a one-day job. It is in itself a foothill to Dublin. There are some political uncertainties, and you would almost certainly feel obliged to do the same pre-Paris. Your diary is already over-full- indeed you have Chairman Hua only the day before

The Prime Minister has in fact declined with regret - the invitation to conduct an interview
with Die Welt before her next visit to Bonn.
We spoke about this by telephone. In practice
she has given no single exclusive interview to any
overseas journal since taking office. Nor indeed
has she given any television interviews other than
those arising in a news context.

Her time between now and 31 October is very much committed; we are in the pre-run to the reassembly of Parliament and she has the visit of Chairman Hua pending. So the portents were not good anyway.

She has, as a matter of fact, only given one interview to the British press since taking office - for "NOW!" - a fortnight ago.
