## 1. Introduction

The results from our latest Gallup 'tracking' study are the same as the results of the Gallup poll published in the Daily Telegraph on 18th December 1981. The survey (giving the first published voting intention figures since Crosby) found $50 \frac{1}{2} \%$ of the electorate claiming they will vote for either the Liberals or the Social Democrats. The survey found $36 \%$ claiming they would vote Social Democrat, $23 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Labour, $23 \%$ Conservative, $14 \frac{1}{2} \%$ Liberal and $3 \%$ for 'other' parties. Since the last published Gallup poll (conducted $11 / 16$ November) support for the Social Democrats has increased from $27 \%$ to $36 \%$. Conservative support has dropped from $26 \frac{1}{2} \%$ to $23 \%$, Labour support has dropped from $29 \%$ to $23 \frac{1}{2} \%$ and Liberal support has remained almost stable ( $15 \%$ - $11 / 16$ November, $14 \frac{1}{2} \%$ 9/14 December Support for the Social Democrats has increased from $29 \frac{1}{2} \%$ in the first tracking study completed after the Croydon NW by-election ( 28 Oct/2 Nov) to $36 \%$ in the latest study. Support has increased from $21 \%$ in first tracking study after Warrington by-election (22/27 July). The trend of support for the Social Democratss in the table below shows a sharp jump is upport for the Social Democrats after the Crosby by-election.

The table below and the attached graph shows details of the trends in support for the main parties since early June.

In terms of the published Gallup polls the Social Democrats have doubled their support since September whilst in terms of published polls the Labour and Conservative Parties have reached a post-war low in terms of support.

In addition to the standard voting intention question considered above Gallup asked 'If an election were to take place tomorrow and the following candidates were standing in your constituercy, how would you vote?'. They found:-

The trend in support for the parties is very similar to that we found in our unprompted voting intention question.

## 2. Government Record

The latest Gailup 'tracking' study found only $18 \%$ of the elector ate approving of the reaord of the Government to date, $70 \%$ disapproved and $12 \%$ did not have a view. This is the lowest level of approval for the record of the Government we have found since May 1979 and we have to go back to Wilson's 1968 Government to find a similar low level of approval. Then only $17 \%$ in April and December approved of the record of the Government.

## 3. Popularity of Political Leaders

Mr Foot's popularity has improved slightly from the nadir reached last month when we found only $16 \%$ of the electorate thought Mr Foot is proving to be a good leader of the Labour Party - the latest survey found $19 \%$ approving of Mr Foot. The survey found only $25 \%$ of the electorate claiming to be satisfied with the record of Mrs Thatcher as Prime Minister - this is the lowest level since May 1979. Mrs Thatcher's popularity is at an all time low when compared with previous post-war Governments. The previous all time low for a post-war Prime Minister was Harold Wilson in May 1968 when his personal popularity stood at $27 \%$.
Approval for Mr Steel remained almost unchanged with $63 \%$ approving of his record as leader of the Liberals, $18 \%$ disapproving and $19 \%$ not have a view.

## 4. Published Polls

(a) Gallup (Daily Telegraph 18/19 December 1981)

Gallup, in their latest Daily Telegraph poll, asked a number of questions in addition to their standard 'tracking' questions.

When Gallup asked respondents what they thought are the most urgent problems the country faces, they found $85 \%$ mentioned unemployment, $40 \%$ cost of living/prices, $14 \%$ other economic problems, $5 \%$ strikes/trade unions and $5 \%$ defence/nuclear weapons.
$56 \%$ of respondents thought there should be a General Election in the near future, $39 \%$ thought the Government should carry on, and $4 \%$ did not have a view. When Gallup asked tierespective of how you yourself will vote, who
do you think will win the next General Election' - $28 \%$ mentioned the Social Democrats, $23 \%$ Labour and $12 \%$ the Conservatives.

Gallup also asked a range of questions on the electorate's approval or disapproval of the Government's handing of a number of issues. They found:-

$37 \%$ of the electorate approved of our record on defence and armaments $46 \%$ disapproved and $17 \%$ did not have a view. Among Conservative supporters $65 \%$ approved of our record, $17 \%$ disapproved and $17 \%$ did not have a view. Among Labour supporters $15 \%$ approved, $68 \%$ disapproved and $17 \%$ id not have a view. Among Liberal supporters, $32 \%$ approved, $53 \%$ disapprove and $15 \%$ did not have a view. Among Social Democrats $39 \%$ approved, $46 \%$ disapproved and $14 \%$ did not have a view.
$18 \%$ of the electorate approved of our record on dealing with the problem of cost of living and prices - including $55 \%$ of Conservative supporters, $4 \%$ of Labour supporters, $3 \%$ of Liberal supporters and $13 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters. $78 \%$ of the electorate disapprove of our record in cost of living and prices including $38 \%$ of Conservative supporters, $96 \%$ of Labour supporters, $92 \%$ of Liberal supporters and $85 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters.
$20 \%$ of the electorate approved of our record on economic and financial affairs - $68 \%$ disaffroved ant $12 \%$ did not have a view. $62 \%$ of Conservative supporters approved, $86 \%$ of Labour supporters disapproved, as did $71 \%$ of Liberal supporters and $81 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters.
$35 \%$ of electors approved of our record on strikes and Labour relations, $56 \%$ disapproved and $9 \%$ did not have a view. Among Conservative upporters, $63 \%$ approved, $31 \%$ disapproved and $6 \%$ did not have a view. Among Labour supporters $18 \%$ approved, $72 \%$ disapproved and $10 \%$ did not have a view. Among Liberal supporters $28 \%$ approved, $61 \%$ disapproved and $11 \%$ did not have a view. Among Social Democrats supporters $33 \%$ approved of our record on strikes and Labour relations, $60 \%$ disapproved and $7 \%$ did not have a view.

On the issue of full employment - $12 \%$ approved of our record, $81 \%$ disapproved and $7 \%$ did not have a view. $53 \%$ of Conservative supporters disapproved of our record, as did $92 \%$ of Labour supportes, $87 \%$ of Liberal supporters and $90 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters.

With regard to education policy $27 \%$ approved, $62 \%$ disapproved and $12 \%$ did not have a view. $37 \%$ of Conservative supporters disapproved of our record in this area, as did $70 \%$ of Labour supporters, $72 \%$ of Liberal supporters and $69 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters.

In the health service area $28 \%$ approved of our policies, $64 \%$ disapproved and $8 \%$ did not have a view. Among Conservative supporters $55 \%$ approved of our record, $36 \%$ disapproved and $9 \%$ did not have a view. Among Labour supporters $19 \%$ approved, $77 \%$ disapproved and $4 \%$ did not have a view. Among Liberal supporters $28 \%$ approved $64 \%$ disapproved and $8 \%$ did not have a view. Among Social Democrat supporters, $19 \%$ approved, $74 \%$ disapproved and $6 \%$ did not heve a viem.

On the issue of housing - $32 \%$ approved of our record, $55 \%$ disapproved and $13 \%$ did not have a view. $69 \%$ of Gonservative supporters approved of our record in this area ( $17 \%$ disapproved), $76 \%$ of Labour supporters disapproved ( $15 \%$ approved) , $57 \%$ of Liberal supporters disapproved ( $29 \%$ approved) and $57 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters ( $25 \%$ approved).
On the issue of the Common Market $40 \%$ approved of our record, $44 \%$ disapproved and $17 \%$ did not have a view. $72 \%$ of Conservative supporters approved of our record, $13 \%$ disapproved and $15 \%$ did not have a yiew. Anong Labour supporters $15 \%$ approved of our record, $64 \%$ disapproved and $20 \%$ did no $\begin{aligned} & \text { have a view. Among Liberal supporters } 39 \% \text { approved of our }\end{aligned}$ record, $49 \%$ disapproved and $13 \%$ did not have a view. Among Sociai Democrats $41 \%$ afproved of our record, $46 \%$ disapproved and $13 \%$ did not have a view.
With regard to old age pensioners, $34 \%$ of electors approved of our policies, $55 \%$ disapproved and $11 \%$ did not have a view. $27 \%$ of Conservative supporters disapproved of our record ( $67 \%$ approved), $75 \%$ of Labour supporters dis=pproved ( $18 \%$ approved), $55 \%$ of Liber 1 supporters disapproved ( $31 \%$ approved) and among Social Democrat supporters $61 \%$ disapproved (30\% approved).

On the question of immigration $32 \%$ approved of our record, $51 \%$ cisafprad, and $17 \%$ did not have a view. $50 \%$ of Conservative supporters approved our record on immigration, $59 \%$ of Labour supporters disapproved, $53 \%$ of Liberal supporters disapproved as did $53 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters.
$27 \%$ of the electorate approved of our policy on roads - $51 \%$ disapproved and $22 \%$ did not have a view.

With regard to law and order $48 \%$ approved of our policies, $41 \%$ disapproved and $10 \%$ did not have a view. Anong Conservative supporters $66 \%$ approved of our record, $27 \%$ disapproved and $8 \%$ did not have a view. Among Labour supporters $29 \%$ approved, $56 \%$ disapproved and $15 \%$ did not have a view. Among Liberal supporters $56 \%$ spproved, $38 \%$ disapproved and $6 \%$ did not have a view. Among Social Democrat supporters $54 \%$ approved of our record of law and order, $38 \%$ dieapproved and $6 \%$ did not have a view.
$19 \%$ of the electorate approved of our record on taxation, $72 \%$ disapproved and $9 \%$ did not have a view. $45 \%$ of Conservative supporters approved ( $45 \%$ disapproved), $89 \%$ of Labour supporters disapproved ( $4 \%$ approved) $78 \%$ of Liberal supporters disapproved ( $13 \%$ approved) and $76 \%$ of Social Democrat supporters disapproved of our record on taxation ( $19 \%$ approved).

In addition to these questions Gallup also asked respondents who they thought would make the best leader of the Social Democrat Party - $41 \%$ thought Shirley Williams, $22 \%$ Roy Jenkins, $17 \%$ David Owen and $2 \%$ William Rodgers. When asked who they thought would make the best leader of the Alliance - $39 \%$ thought David Steel, $22 \%$ Shirley Williams, $13 \%$ Roy Jenkins, $8 \%$ David Ewen and $1 \%$ William Rodgers.
(b) Marplan (The Guardian 21st December 1981)

The Guardian on 21 st December including the results of a Marplan poll conducted between 14 th to 16 © h December on attitudes to the National Health Service.

Marplan found $71 \%$ of the electorate thought the National Healtin Service represents value for money to the taxpayer - $21 \%$ thought it does not and $8 \%$ did not have a view.

Marplan asked respondents 'Would you say the treatment you got from your

Health Service GP was on the whole very good, fairly good, not very good or not at all good?' They found $58 \%$ of respondents thought the treatement they received was 'very good', $33 \%$ 'Fairly good', $7 \%$ 'not very good' and $2 \%$ 'not good at all'. On the question of service from the National Health Service Hospitals $67 \%$ saw these as being ' very good:, $25 \%$ 'fairly good', $7 \%$ 'not very good' and $2 \%$ 'not at all good'.

Marplan also asked respondents 'Overall, would you say that the services offered under the NHS are not in need of change or in need of change?' $30 \%$ thought they are not in need of change and $64 \%$ in need of change.

Marplan asked respondents 'The Government is considering whether to end the practice of financing the Health Service by taxation and switch to a health service insurance system. In principle do you think this is a good idea or a bad idea?' $33 \%$ thought this would be a good idea, $50 \%$ a bad idea and $16 \%$ did not have a view. They also fut to respondents a number of option for the provision of health service care in Britain - they found:-

Make the service a private one, with everyone choosing and paying for the $\begin{array}{llll}\text { service they want (\%) } & 13 & 83 & 4\end{array}$

Empioyers/trade unions should offer private or higher grade health care as a 'perk' or incentive (\%)

On the question of how much extra electors would be prepared to pay to opt out of the NHS for a private service, $23 \%$ gave a figure of under £100 a year, $15 \%$ up to £ 200 a year, $8 \%$ § 300 or more and $54 \%$ did not have a view.
