## 1. Introduction

The interviewing for our latest Gallup study was conducted before the Budget - from 3rd to 8 th March. This unpublished Gallup study found $331 / 2 \%$ claiming they would vote labour, 30\% Conservative, $21 \%$ Social Democrat (or Alliance) and 4\% for 'other' parties.

An MORI survey conducted on the day after the Budget (March 10th) and published in the Daily Star on Friday March 12th found a Conservative lead in terms of voting intention. MORI found $37 \%$ claiming they would vote Conservative, $33 \%$ Labour, $19 \%$ SDP (or Alliance), $8 \%$ Liberal and 3\% for 'other' parties. Until we have confirmation of these findings from later research, the results of this single poll need to be treated with a degree of caution.

Since early December 1981 Alliance support has collapsed - our 'tracking' study in early December (2/7) found $51 \frac{1}{2} \%$ claiming they would vote Liberal or Social Democrat - in the latest Gallup study ( $3 / 8$ March) this was down to $321 / 2 \%$ and in the MORI post-Budget study down to $26 \%$. The table on the following page shows the trend of support since June 1981.

Turning to the Hillhead by-election, since the Systems Three poll (conducted 6/7 March) which found a $1 \%$ Labour lead over the Conservatives (32\% Labour, 31\% Conservative, $25 \%$ Alliance and $11 \%$ SNP) we have had two opinion polls in the constituency.

The results of the telephone polls should be treated with a degree of caution as they tend to underestimate Labour support. What is clear from both the polls is the closeness of Conservative and Labour support and the poor showing of Roy Jenkins.

## 2. Government Record

The interviewing for this survey was conducted before the Budget - and found $24 \%$ approving of the record of the Government to date, $65 \%$ disapproving and $11 \%$ did not answer. The interviewing for our next study will have been conducted after the Budget and will reflect in part reactions to the Budget.

## 3. Popularity of Political Leaders

The latest study found a slight fall in Mrs Thatcher's popularity - it still remains well above the ratio reached just before Christmas. It found almost no change in Mr Foot's popularity and a slight improvement in Mr Steel's popularity.

## 4. Published Polls

(a) MORI (Daily Star March 12th 1982)

The Daily Star on Friday March 12th included the results of an MORI poll conducted immediately after the Budget (Wednesday 1Oth March). MORI found a $4 \%$ Conservative lead over Labour - $37 \%$ claimed they would vote Conservative, $33 \%$ Labour, 19\% SDP/Alliance, $8 \%$ Liberal and $3 \%$ for 'other' parties.

MORI also asked a number of questions on public attitudes to the economy and the Budget. They found a majority of electors who believe that Britain's economic situation is likely to improve in the next 12 months - or at least get no worse. They found $31 \%$ thinking the economic situation will improve, $28 \%$ not change and $39 \%$ get worse.

MORI asked whether respondents thought the Budget measures were a good or a bad thing for them personally and for the country. They found $36 \%$ thought the measures would be good for them personally, $47 \%$ bad and $17 \%$ did not answer. $48 \%$ thought the Budget will be good for the country, $38 \%$ bad and $14 \%$ did not answer.
$59 \%$ thought the Budget was better for them personally than they expected, $21 \%$ worse than expected and $20 \%$ did not answer. The most popular measures in the Budget were increased pensions ( $96 \%$ in favour) and more money to ease youth unemployment ( $80 \%$ in favour). Most unpopular measure was the increased tax on petrol - disapproved of by $80 \%$. Increased beer prices were disapproved of by $50 \%$ to $46 \%$ but dearer tobacco was approved of by $53 \%$ to $43 \%$.
(b) NOP (Observer 14th March 1982)

An NOP survey conducted in Glasgow Hillhead was published in The Observer on 14 th March. When the voting intention figures are re-calculated to exclude $22 \%$ don't knows, they found $34 \%$ claiming they will vote Labour, $30 \%$ Conservative, $21 \%$ Alliance and B5\% SNP.

## (c) Telephone Survey Research Unit (Sunday Standard 14th March 1982)

The Scottish Newspaper 'The Sunday Standard' on 14th March included details of a telephone survey̆ conducted in Hillhead on 13th March. The results of this latest survey and earlier telephone polls are shown below:-

The latest figures exclude $8 \%$ 'don't knows'. These polls have found a movement of support from the Alliance and Labour to the Conservatives.

The survey found a majority of Hillhead voters thought the Budget would be good for them personally and $69 \%$ thought it would be good for the economy. Sir Geoffrey Howe received a strong endorsement with $68 \%$ of the electorate saying they thought he was doing a good job. Only $36 \%$ thought that Roy Jenkins would do a better job as Chancellor and $42 \%$ thought a Labour Budget would be better. In Hillhead, $31 \%$ thought the Budget was 'too tough', $48 \%$ 'about right' and 21\% 'not tough enough'.
